

Why this assembly?

We are organising this assembly to

... take stock together of what is happening in Brussels and in the member states. This year marks a new legislative period at EU level plus a number of national elections. We want to shed light on what we can expect to see in the field of climate, sustainable development and environment in Europe.

... to facilitate undisturbed and structured exchanges. The success of our network depends on the quality of our exchanges and the strength of our relationships. This requires dedicated time. Seeing each other in a relaxed and private setting will hopefully help us understand our own councils better.

... to map out what the next year(s) will bring for us as a network. We want to plan together for becoming better at following and reacting to policy shifts. Coming together will help us focus and prioritise our shared needs. Specifically when it comes to EU policy developments.

What will the assembly be focused on?

The assembly will take place over the course of one full day and one half day. We have divided the time into **four thematic sessions**.

Impact

We will start with new perspectives on our own value as councils. How do we measure impact? What should we monitor after we publish? When are we successful? And most importantly what other ways of advice-giving, that are not advice publications, are councils using to help their governments and parliaments?

Insight

From here we will make a sharp turn to listen to external experts who will give insights on the current European policy landscape and what this means for sustainable development and climate policies.

Identity

After that we will have a closed session on how these developments affect our work and what possible challenges we foresee in the near future. We will speak about the structure of public governance, both at EU and national level.

Influence

We will finish with a practical lookout on how we can use our collective work as bundled by the *European Green Deal Review* project as a learning document for influencing the way we work in the future. This session is meant to spark and deepen ideas on how we can work together in the new year.

Session on our role in policymaking: new ways of assessing our impact

Structure of the session

3-4 councils are invited to present their reflections and possible monitoring of their impact. In this session we will use concrete examples to share and map ways of working. What different kinds of impact? What is it about our work that shapes our impact? Examples fall into the following categories:

1. Measuring policy output: when were publications a success? (40 min)
2. Follow-up after advice: how to do this e.g. the ways of keeping in touch with relevant stakeholders (40 min)
3. Beyond publications: Alternative impact-making e.g. a deep dive into what it means to become active participants in policy making (40 min)

2-3 speeches about post-election EU and the future of climate, environment and sustainable development policymaking by invited speakers (tba) and a subsequent panel debate among them

Guiding Questions: What are the macro trends of the coming months and years? What will this Commission do differently? How will geopolitics play a role here? What are the implications for organizations like our councils?

After one hour, we will open the floor for questions from the room and facilitate a conversation following Chatham house rules among all participants and the panelists

Structure of the session

Discussion under Chatham house rules. We will ask all to discuss the role of our councils (individually, not as a network) using a SWOT analysis (Strength, Weakness, Opportunity, Threat). Going of trends mentioned in the previous session and other Changing political composition trends of 2024

- Structure of public governance
- Semantics and new and alternative framings of sustainability
- Right wing EU politicians (diagnosis, what will happen in the coming year, interpretations)

Guiding questions to prepare for the assembly

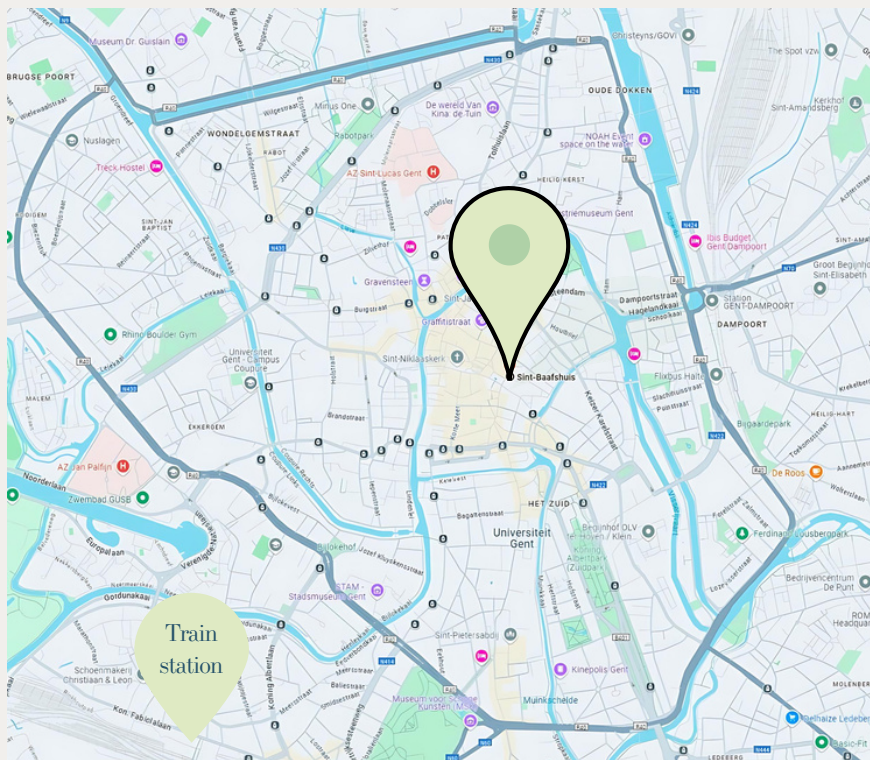
1. What ways of working this past year have made a difference in your council? What activities have led to impact and why?
2. What questions regarding EU policy making post 2024 do you have for the speakers? What themes do you want to dive deeper into?
3. What questions around identity and societal standing of your council keep coming up in the past year? How has the political situation in your region affected your council?
4. What do you need from the network? What policy updates would you prioritise and like to receive? What topics inside our field interest you most?

Other helpful actions: bringing your council's working plan of this year and the[draft] year plan for next year, reaching out with materials to share as readings for other participants, thinking about the EEAC year plan of 2025 and bringing ideas for webinar formats, working group themes or project-based activities for the EEAC next year.
